# Upskilling and enabling progression through the Nurse Associate Programme



Upskilling, learning and developing the people who work in the Excelcare family is something we not only encourage, but take pride in. Enabling people to fulfil their potential through knowledge and experience is not only beneficial to the person, but to the people they care for and their colleagues.

One of these key courses that people can choose to enrol in to achieve a qualification and support a long career in caring, is the Nurse Associate Programme. This programme bridges the gap between healthcare support workers and registered nurses, enabling people to deliver hands-on person-centred care. Successful completion of this course awards people with a Nursing Associate Foundation Degree, which usually involves two years of higher-level study. Once qualified, it provides a route for further training into a Registered Nurse Role.
