Many of the residents remember when this was aired back in 1945 and have some clear memories of it. Rene (aged 98) was in the RAF during the war and aged twenty three on VE Day. Rene says "I can remember there being lots of happiness and celebrations outside. We had a street party with bunting. We were all singing and very happy".

Masie (aged 100) also remembers VE day in 1945 and said, "It was an awful war, but we did get some fun out of it. I can remember when there was an explosion at Bramble Island and I was very lucky to survive. So when war was declared over we did celebrate on VE Day. I can remember lots of merriment at the street parties we had. I married shortly after the war. My wedding dress was made from silk from parachutes by a local dressmaker called Mrs Toffle".

The afternoon was spent partying away in the garden to some classic Vera Lynn tunes. Entertainer, James Cowdery, had recorded a special VE Day celebration show as he couldn't be there in person. This really helped to lift spirits and was the next best thing to seeing him in person

To mark the occasion and finish the day in style, residents posed for pictures inside a VE day themed frame, to serve as a reminder of their 75th year celebrations.
